40	President Doucette would like to first and most importantly emphasize to the General Assembly
41	that the tuition and fees situation has become both public and intense. He has submitted no written
42	report but wishes to speak on a couple of issues.

44	He is very excited about quorum being present on Friday night as this is the first session where
45	this has occurred. Work is continuing to be done regarding UNC Today, which is an initiative

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developed by the Student Body Presidents and Executive Officers. This will be a survey on the
 UNC system as a whole similar to UNC Tomorrow. He is pleased to report the UNC General
 Administration has finally come on board and work can begin to be finally underway; the
 Academic and Student Affairs Committee will be briefed more on UNC Today in committee.

Further concerning the tuition and fees issue. As we remember, ASG adopted a resolution asking that the Board of Governors lower the cap on tuition and fees before they even began to deliberate the issue. President Erskine Bowles was then quoted in the Daily Tar Heel saying why he thought we had "jumped the gun." Plans have began for cuts coming from both UNC General Administration and the NC General Assembly, and therefore a second resolution will be generated during this business meeting and adopted to reiterate the purpose of the first resolution and have our desires heard. The Daily Tar Heel has already begun calling certain BOG members to make them aware of the legislation that will come from this meeting, which is proof that we have come a long way because they have taken notice. The Board of Governors has asked for consideration of a number of different perspectives, which is something the Council of Student Body Presidents will approach tomorrow. President Doucette asks that delegates please bear in mind that what we do has influence and impacts all 300,000 students in the University. This is about them, not us.

Ashley M. Yopp, Senior Vice President

Senior Vice President brings greeting to the General Assembly on behalf of her hometown of Dunn, NC. SVP Yopp has submitted a written and implores all members to read and review it. There are a few key points she would like to go over, the first being the start to improved communication. SVP Yopp will be beginning virtual office hours from ECU and also bi-weekly conference calls with the Vice Presidents.

SVP Yopp would also like to see leadership transition documents put into place in order to ensure an easy transition between administrations. In light of the discussion and decision on hotel cost reductions for USSA Board members, SVP Yopp believes we should begin to look internally at the way we utilize our budget and look at eliminating the Saturday night stays to save money and reallocate funding for better uses.

In light of recent events SVP Yopp would also like to see a UNCASG Code of Conduct collectively created to be adopted by the General Assembly. President Bass of NCAT asked if the Code of Conduct would be discussed in committee. SVP Yopp replied that the Code of Conduct would be discussed in the Council of Student Body Presidents meeting and brought forth next month to the General Assembly.

- 219 significant and deliberate consideration. He asks that we plant seeds to grow beyond the crisis.
- 220 Dr. Conway looks forward to speaking to us as student leaders, and also hopes to speak to the
- 221 NCSSM delegation as he once sat on their Board of Trustees.

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226 Mr. Tony Rand, State Senator (District 19 - Bladen, Cumberland)

President Doucette introduces State Senator Tony Rand. Senator Rand is delighted to be here this morning and welcomes us to Fayetteville, but is depressed about the circumstances surrounding our arrival (in reference to the state's budget reductions).

Senator Rand does not think nor does he remember us ever having been in an economic state like this before. The longest recession he remembers has only lasted 14-16 months (housing recession). He believes a great deal of this current crisis has been brought about by nothing more than greed from companies such as Merrill Lynch, and this is further proof that we need regulation in the market. He finds it both depressing and distressing that federal regulations are not being enforced. For government on the state level it becomes difficult because we cannot print money like the federal government, therefore we can only spend what we has been made available.

Unemployment in NC could rise above 8% and we have yet to reach rock bottom. The financial sector, which is taking a tough hit, makes up 15% of the jobs in the state of North Carolina. Though we have reconstituted our economy and modernized it, jobs will still be lost. That makes it difficult for the state because personal income tax is 55% of the state's economy and all sectors of the economy are failing. The budget deficit will be hard to predict until April when sales taxes come in but there is an estimated \$2 billion dollar shortfall at this time.

This affects students because about 60% of the state's budget is focused on education. Outside of education, the mental health system is in crisis and money must be used for that along with Medicaid and the prison system. Another unexpected expense/crisis is the problem with the state health plan and this will require significant funding. The governor has the responsibility to ensure that the budget is balanced; Governor Easley didn't want what happened to him in regards to the budget deficit to happen to Governor Purdue once she took office, so he initiated the budget reductions. Governor Purdue has made cuts across the board (6% to the University system), and it had been asked that the budget for the UNC system be cut by \$22 million dollars and now it is being called to cut closer to \$100 million dollars.

The General Assembly has frozen parts of the budget including renovations. If UNC has to cut 7% then they will lose \$175 million dollars and will have to make big reductions across the board. The UNC system may have to increase tuition in order to supplement the losses from the budget cuts. UNC has asked for an expansion and asked for money that has been traditionally given in the past. Enrollment growth is also playing a large hand in what is being done as far as budget cuts within the system are concerned. Our university system is what has separated North Carolina from the rest of the South because it has allowed the state to contribute to the nation in a meaningful way, so it becomes hard and painful to look at having to make cuts and raise tuition.

The federal government will not allow the state to tax catalog and internet sales, and it seems unfair because the stores who contribute to the community are here working hard but those via the internet get a tax reduction. Those taxes could help to supplement some of the losses that are taking place. Raising "sin taxes" has been talked about and this is always popular, except with those who sin. The state is looking at a stimulus package provided by the federal government and

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that money will help put people to work, and North Carolina could receive as much as \$1 billion dollars.

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Most states in the South have cut the budget of their university system, and California's budget deficit is bigger than the total NC's budget, but North Carolina will do what it has always done and make the best of what it has got. Senator Rand thanks the association for letting him be here and for their time and attention.

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Senator Rand reiterates that he is very interested in financial welfare of the state and our students, and he is hopeful about what the election of President Obama means.

# Second Reading of Legislation: R19, Universal Access Support Act

Committee Chairman Rachel Hicks (ASU) delivers the committee report regarding the legislation.
The resolution was reported favorably by the committee by a vote of 6 in favor to 1 opposed. On behalf of the committee, moves adoption of the resolution (no second required per Robert's Rules).

President Doucette delivers the sponsor's report on the legislation. R19 is largely self-explanatory. Issue began as a collaboration with UNCA. Community college system is required by state law to accept any student who wants to enroll. If you are a citizen, you can present documentation to show you are a resident of North Carolina and receive in-state tuition. If not, you have to pay out-of-state tuition. That is the UNC system policy as well, considered an "open door" policy.

A few years ago, members of the Community College Board argued that going to a community college is a public benefit and therefore only citizens should be allowed to enroll. They changed their system then to where you have to prove you are a US citizen to be enrolled. Has flip-flopped several times since then as Presidents have changed running the community college system. Last year, a member of the Community College Board asked the NC Attorney General for a statement on whether or not it was legal for the system to accept non-citizens. An Assistant Attorney General told them to change their policy and they did. News & Observer contacted Department of Homeland Security, who informed them that the college system did not have to change their policy; it's in each state's discretion. The Attorney General himself later agreed and said his department's earlier advice was wrong. The community college system did not undo their changes to the policy, despite the switch to a "closed door" policy being based on false legal advice.

 As ASG, we have not yet taken a stance on this situation. The Community College President, the community college equivalent of ASG, and the University system have all said they support an "open door" policy. This resolution is our way of supporting the N4CSGA and helping them get the community college system to go back to an "open door" policy.

Delegate Dunbar (FSU) asks for a simple clarifying statement of what delegates are being asked to

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support. President Doucette responded that he is asking us to endorse the same "open door" policy that the UNC system has, and trying to pressure the community college system to do the same.
